

# California VETUNDATUS: A SNAPSHOT

#### FOUNDATIONS IN FOCUS 1

In **2011**, **7,768** foundations called California home, nearly one out of every ten foundations in the U.S. They held assets of **\$103 billion**—about 16% of all U.S. foundation assets—and accounted for **\$6.4 billion** in giving, or 13% of the grantmaking dollars of all U.S. foundations.


California foundations were hard hit by the "Great Recession," but assets and giving are slowly nearing their pre-recession levels.





Most of California's foundations are young, having been established in the last 20 years.<sup>2</sup>

Community foundations play a distinctive role, largely fueled by the popularity of donor-advised funds and the trend toward "giving while living."

### % Of Foundation Giving Made By Community Foundations






A handful of the largest foundations in the state hold the great majority of foundation assets and are responsible for most foundation giving in California. The majority of the state's foundations and two-thirds of foundation assets and giving are located in Los Angeles County and the San Francisco Bay Area.<sup>3</sup>



#### **GRANTMAKING IN FOCUS** 5

Education was the top funding area and has been since 2005; previously Health held the top spot for foundation grant dollars with the introduction of a number of large, health-focused foundations created from the conversion of nonprofit healthcare organizations. Human Services received 25% of grants but only 11% of grant dollars, reflecting the smaller size of grants that are targeted to small and mid-sized human service nonprofits.



#### **DID YOU KNOW?**



Foundations devote most of their grantmaking dollars (51%) to programs as well as to general operating support (24%) and research (17%).



As a percentage of their total giving, California foundations gave 2.5 times as much to Science and Technology as foundations nationally, and three times as much to the Environment.



80% (over \$5 billion) of giving by California foundations went to nonprofits in the state. Over \$1 billion in grants received by California nonprofits came from foundations outside the state.
